



"Many weathered surfaces captured well using leading lines. Using windows and buildings as frames well thought out."


"Captures the texture and feel of the cold steel."

What are the best camera settings for athletics photography?



Sam Barnes | WSPA Bronze Winner 2024 | Nikon Z9 | Nikon Z 400mm f/2.8 TC VR S | f/2.8 | 1/1600 sec | ISO 800

Shooting Mode: Aperture Priority (with minimum shutter speed set to 1/1000)

Aperture: f/2.8 or minimum available

Shutter Speed: Minimum 1/1000 a second, or between 1/250 and 1/500 to add

body movement.

ISO: 100 (in full sun), 200 (overcast) or Auto ISO (at night)

White Balance: Auto (adjust as needed for indoor or unusual lighting)

Focus Mode: Continuous (AI Servo on Canon)

Autofocus Area: Expanded AF point (surrounding points active)

Drive Mode: High-speed continuous (burst)

File Format: Full Quality JPEG

Which shutter speed should I use for athletics?

A minimum shutter speed of 1/1000 will help you freeze the action and eliminate most motion blur from your athletics photography.

Which lens do I need for athletics?

A 400mm lens works well for athletics photography, and professional sports photographer Iris van den Broek recommends a 400mm focal length.

Which f-stop or aperture should I use for athletics?

Generally speaking, any aperture between f/2.8 to f/4 is ideal for athletics photography.

What autofocus mode should I use for athletics?

Your camera's autofocus mode will depend on it. However, for the best autofocus results, we recommend using your camera's continuous subject-tracking mode.

How many frames per second do I need for athletics?

You should shoot at a minimum of 5 fps for athletics photography.

First place 34/45 Paul Ranelli Old Friends

"Wonderful faces of joy - creates strong impact. Sharp. and excellent color. Depth of field is shallow enough to be effective at keeping background from being overly distractive."

"Great capture full of emotional wealth. Light is good with the highlights, but no harsh shadows. Unfortunately, the car in the back is a bit (albeit small) distraction."

"WHAM....good shot and is a great attention getter and story teller all wound into one. Great exposure (side light) and although centered this is THE time to not care about that rule! Only 1 minor problem and that is the aspen sapling growing out of Margie's left ear/shoulder. It tries to steal the eye but the rest of the image reels it back in."



Second place 33/45 PawanG Love Vibes at Beach

"Beautiful emotional scene, and the black-n-white treatment helps to focus on the couples happy caring faces. Sharp, good management of depth of field."

"Nice moment and well processed in grayscale. Not sure all of the sky at the top is necessary in the composition, plus this will make the vignette a bit less noticeable. Having one (top one, maybe both) faces a little more toward camera might make it easier to connect for the viewer. Watch your sensor dust, by the way."

"the couple by itself is a stunning picture. That part would write a short love story. It looks like you may have tried to vignette the image in post processing but I may be right or wrong. The problem is the building growing out of the back of his head and the buildings farther down the beach. Way less depth of field could have helped so the buildings would be out of focus. They would still be there but hopefully not recognizable as structures. Still ,love the impact!"

Third place 32/45 Tim Beaulier Dear John



"Strong contrasts and colors heighten impact.

Suggest cropping from the left, about a third of the image. There is little of interest to that side of the image, and not needed to tell the story of the hurt heart."

"Interesting and visually appealing. I see, "I love to hike," all over this. Well done adding the shoe tread with a sliver of sky between the rock to dramatically drive home the point. Unsure if the title helps the concept of the image, however, especially due to the multiple idioms derived."

"Impact is striking and is obviously telling a story. Composition is good but the focus at the bottom and the background is creating a visual problem and exposure is dark. There is detail in the boot. It would probably work better with no detail, as a complete silhouette with just the heart showing the light along with the background. Very creative idea though.




Recommended Reading for Photo Fans Books from B&H's Bestseller List

By Joe McNally

Lighting master Joe McNally has a distinctive way with words, which is at the fore in this insightful book. Using his own photos to illustrate a wide range of techniques, McNally reveals invaluable tricks and tips, while sharing the stories behind each shot and the challenges inherent in different types of assignments. A second book by McNally, Sketching Light: An Illustrated Tour of the Possibilities of Flash, is available as an e-book, allowing you to read and learn on the go.



The Elements of Photography, Understanding and Creating Sophisticated Images, 2nd edition

By Angela Faris Belt

Author, photographer and educator Angela Faris Belt combines an instructional guidebook with inspirational images meant to push photographers to improve both their technique and their photographic vision. Centered around the basic elements of metering and exposure, a photographic frame and its borders, the quality of focus determined by aperture or lens, shutter speed in relation to time and motion, and the physical media used to create an image, each chapter is backed up by practical exercises to demonstrate how photography's technical attributes affect visual outcomes and meaning. Featuring the work of more than 40 photographers, the book is extensively illustrated with more than 300 color photographs, ranging from commercial photography to fine-art landscapes.



Inspiration in Photography: Training Your Mind to Make Great Art a Habit


By Brooke Shaden

Avid self-portraitist Brooke Shaden firmly believes that, as a photographer, it's possible to train your mind to see inspiration in any situation. She wrote this book to show you how, aiming to help you develop inspiration using exercises based on your everyday surroundings. After introducing readers to her creative process, Shaden shares tips on how to plan, compose, and shoot the colorful, atmospheric, fairy-tale-like fine art photographs that are her hallmark, so you can adapt her methods to your own photographic style. Straddling the line between insight and instruction, Shaden's book offers readers a useful roadmap to recognizing and developing inspiration whenever, and wherever, you need it.



Photojournalism: The Professional's Approach, 7th Edition By Kenneth Kobre

Ken Kobré, founder of the photojournalism program at San Francisco State, penned the definitive book on photojournalism, delivering a blend of insightful interviews with professionals, practical techniques, and high-impact photographs. Often referred to as the "bible" of the industry, this seventh edition features updates on social media in photojournalism, shooting video on smart phones, and the use of drones to cover the news. Updated chapters on audio and video are joined by a revised and expanded business chapter, which outlines how to make a living in photojournalism. New interviews and case studies, including many from international locales, bring readers on assignment with industry greats, whose experiences provide guidance for how to take your work from a hobby to a profession.





As I write this, "Spring" is just around the corner, although I'm not sure which corner it is lurking behind but I am looking forward to some warmer weather and spring photography: The Great Lakes shipping season for 2025 will begin on March 25, 2025, when the Soo Locks open. FYI: The distance from the Atlantic Ocean to Duluth, MN is 2,038 nautical miles (2,342 statute miles or 3,700 kilometers), 8.5 sailing days and includes some 245,750 square kilometers (95,000 square miles) of navigable waters. Average speed is 12 mph (10.4 knots). We also look for early signs of spring with flowers and here are 16 of the most popular early bloomers: Pussy Willow, Daffodil, Creeping Phlox (hmmm, I've seen this one and never knew the name), Snowdrops, Crocus, Adonis, Forsythia, Flowering Quince, Witch Hazel, Star Magnolia, Lenten Rose, Pasque Flower, Winter Jasimne, Creeping Myrtle, Glory-of-the-Snow, and Siberian Squill (information gathered from Thespruce.com).

And lastly, we look for babies. No, not human babies, rather animal babies. I know most of you know by now most of the babies that are born in the spring and here are 8 babies: Baby pigs, baby fox (the highest birth rate for fox is March), Baby Seal, Baby Racoon, Baby Black Bears, Baby Sheep, Baby Chickens and Baby Monkeys (I might have to take a trip to the zoo for this one). Of course there are ground squirrels, bobcat kits, Kestrels, Coyotes, yep, salamanders, red-tailed hawks, tarantulas, and monarchs start migrating in the spring.

There are so many "Spring" things to get us out with our cameras and hopefully we can see new things this spring as we get out a little more. Oh, and don't forget a favorite for some is the migration of the White Pelicans also this spring.



44 Tips to Improve Your Photography

If you are going for **symmetry**, make sure you nail it. A few inches in one direction can upset the image's symmetry, and your audience (and you) will know you were going for symmetry and missed. Photography can be a game of inches.

Pay attention to the **frame edges**. The image is more than the subject (usually). Scrutinize the corners and the sides and top and bottom of your frame. everything working together well, or is something completely out of place? Can you adjust to remove the "noise" of a busy scene? Look at the whole so the whole does not detract from your subject.

Look for **light**. **Light** is everything in photography. Spend your time looking for light, even if you aren't taking photos. Look for sun beams and breaks, reflections, shadows, natural light, artificial light. See how light interacts with the environment. See light.

The wonderful side effect of light is **shadow**. Shadow is as valuable as light and gives depth and shape to objects. Use shadow in your images. Don't run from shadow. Embrace it.

There is certainly a place for random snapshots in the world of photography but a coherent **photo project**, especially when it is generated from an internal concept driven by passion, can self-inspire you to create a solid body of work. Do you want to tell a story? Do you want to document social or physical change? Use your camera to illustrate your thoughts.
